Tyndale Bible Gift to Baker

Mr. and Mrs. Milton McGreevy of Kansas City presented a 1536 edition of a Tyndale Bible to Baker University to be added to the Quayle Bible Collection. It is known as the "Ta Table" edition because of an error in printing. It is supposed to have been published the very year William Tyndale was martyred near Antwerp.

On December 10, 1962, the Thomas Henry Coole Collection of Chinese Bronze Coins was encased in exhibit cabinets and placed on exhibit in the new library building. It contains 1,058 coins and 59 charms and amulets and they extend back a few hundred years before Christ.

Baker University ranks highest among private colleges in Kansas for the number of alumni in *Who's Who in America*. It ranks 145th among more than 1,200 private higher education institutions in the nation and 49th taking its size into consideration. This speaks highly of its educational standards.

Once we understand that self-denial is inescapable, that everybody practices it in one way or another, we begin to see the wisdom of Jesus' invitation. Let a man decide that he wants good health and a strong body. Then he must deny himself the luxury of overeating, the foolish habit of drinking alcoholic beverages and the questionable practice of using tobacco. The goal of good health is reached by self-denial. Or, to take another example, ask the man who has made a real success at business how he did it. His reply will surely include some examples of setting aside immediate desires in order that he might devote himself to achieving long-range goals.

For the remainder of the Lenten season let me suggest that you deny yourself the practice of giving all your reading time to lighter books and magazines. Give some time to serious Bible reading. Take the Book of Romans, and with the help of the Interpreter's Bible, or another commentary, see what the writer says to his generation, and to ours. Or read Our Mission Today, by Tracey K. Jones, Jr., and see the role of the church and of the Christian in this new age.

Here is another suggestion. Deny yourself the attitude that considers casually the benevolences and the World Service enterprise of the church. If you do not know what these terms mean, ask questions about them. Find out about the World Service agencies of The Methodist Church. See how your money talks! See how your dollars actually become your hands, your heart, your voice speaking Christian love near and far. Should you come close enough to persons whose lives are being changed by our Christian witness you will be glad that you are a participant in this worldwide ministry.

Three Suggestions

There are good New Testament grounds for the traditional Lenten emphasis on self-denial. Jesus' word, "whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me" seemed direct and demanding to those who first heard him. They are not less direct and demanding today.

My third suggestion is this. Try denying yourself the habit of insisting on having your own way. Instead, let Christ have his way in your life. Let selfish thoughts and attitudes yield to Christlike thoughts and attitudes. This is not to be unrealistic. It is not to talk of impossibles. It is most realistic and altogether possible. More and more the Christian is expected to deny himself and affirm Christ in thought, speech, and action. To do so is to live
