Welcome Kansas Bishop

The new leader of the quarter million Kansas Methodists, Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe, and his family already have met and been welcomed by many of their people.

Until his election as a bishop of The Methodist Church, June 30, in Dallas, Bishop Stowe had been pastor, since 1951, of St. Luke's Methodist Church in Oklahoma City. With 7,200 members, it is the third largest Methodist church in the nation.

Ordained to the Methodist ministry in 1940, Bishop Stowe is a fifth-generation Methodist preacher ("counting both sides" of his family). He was born in Tennessee, received his higher education in Arkansas, North Carolina, and Massachusetts; served churches in Texas; was a staff member of the Methodist General Board of Education in Nashville; and then went to First Methodist Church, Stillwater, Okla., before going to St. Luke's.

He has a bachelor of arts degree from Hendrix College, Conway, Ark., 1932; bachelor of divinity from Duke University, Durham, N.C., 1935; a doctor of philosophy from Boston University School of Theology, 1938; and honorary doctor of divinity degrees from Oklahoma City University and Hendrix.

Bishop Stowe is the author of two books and has contributed to two others and to religious journals. He has been visiting professor or lecturer at many colleges, universities, graduate schools, pastors' schools, and religious emphasis weeks.

On July 28, 1943, he was married to Twila Farrell, a graduate of Texas Technological College in Lubbock with a degree in music. They have three children: William McFerrin, Jr., born in 1946; Twila Gayle, 1949; and Martha Elizabeth, 1954.






Improvements added at Camp Webster this year include a rest room-shower house, seven hogans, lighting of grounds, and plantings.


